Dear BraveBe Community,

As we reflect on the past year, we'd like to extend our gratitude to our donors, partner agencies, and supporters like you who make our work possible. Your belief in our mission has fueled real change, and we are excited to share the impact we've made together in our 2024 Impact Report.

**This year, BraveBe provided critical support to 7,468 children**, a milestone that reflects the growing need for our services. Of those, **5,233** children received response services, ensuring they had the care and advocacy they deserved in the aftermath of abuse. Another **2,235** children were reached through prevention efforts, helping us take meaningful steps toward breaking the cycle of trauma before it begins. **Additionally, we provided 22,009 advocacy sessions**, guiding families through the challenges of healing with compassion and care.

2024 also marked the launch of **Brave fACES**, a bold new initiative focused on understanding and addressing trauma in our community. This program expands our efforts beyond response, equipping professionals, caregivers, and advocates with the tools to recognize, prevent, and mitigate the effects of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs). By fostering awareness and resilience, Brave fACES will shape a future where fewer children experience the devastating impact of trauma—and those who do receive the support they need to heal.

Thank you for standing with us, for believing in a future where all children are safe, heard, and supported. Together, we are making that vision a reality.

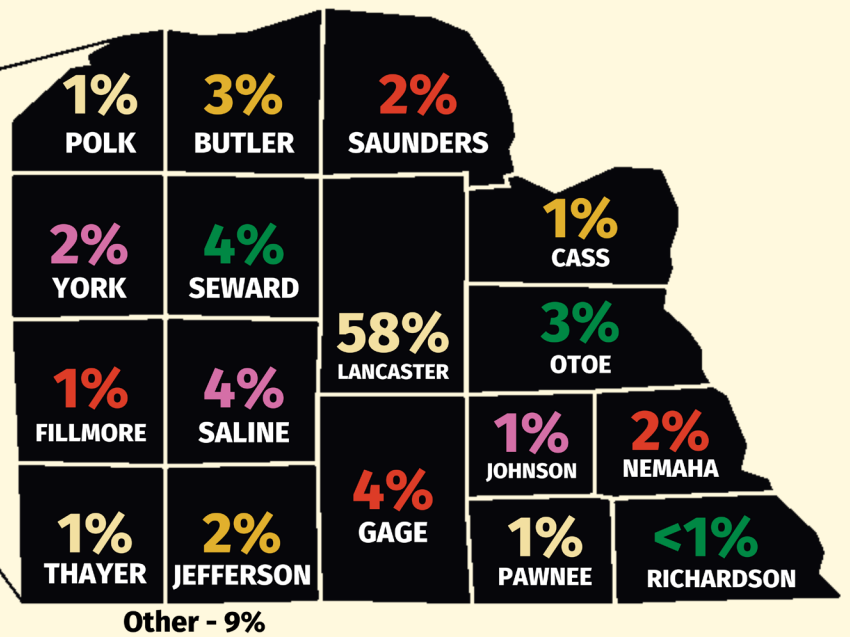

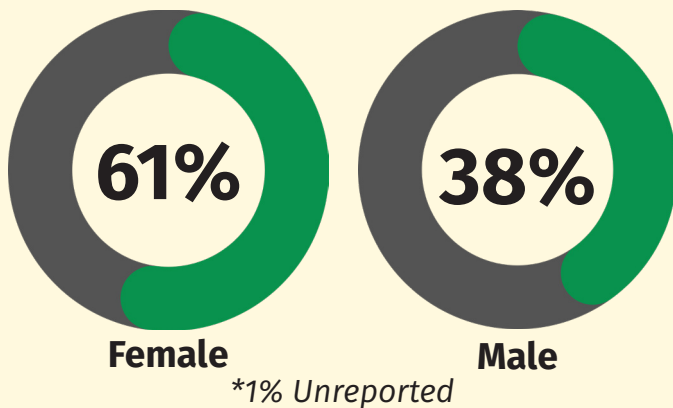


## Counties Served

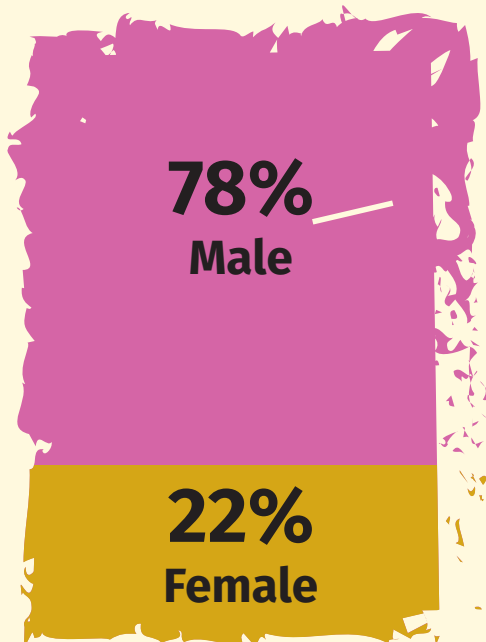

## Sex of Child Served

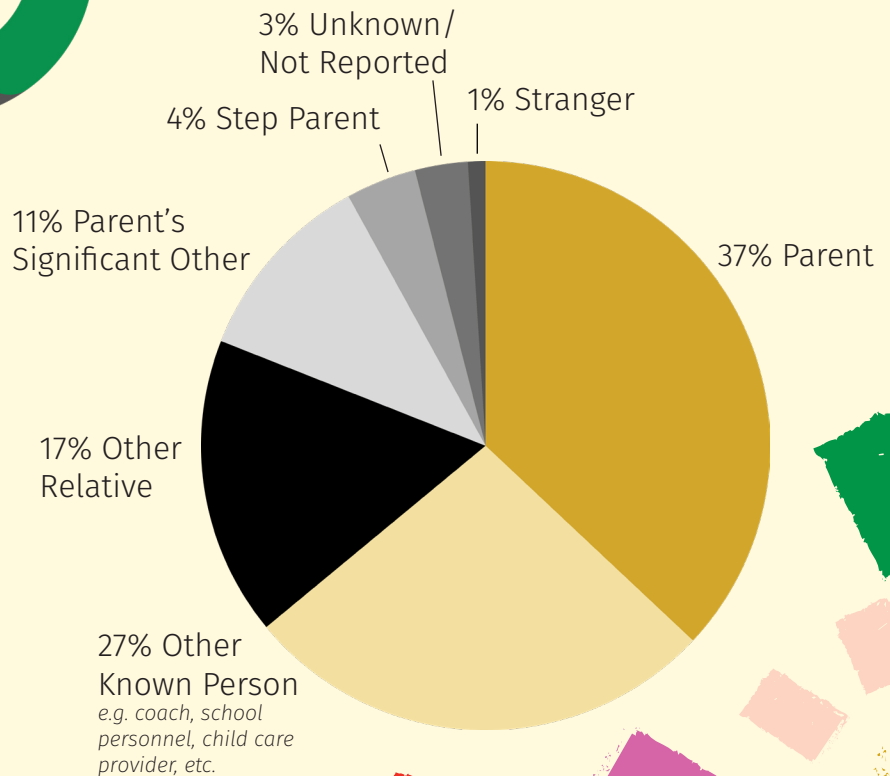


## Sex of Alleged Perpetrator

# **FAMILY ADVOCACY**

## **Advocacy sessions completed in 2024.**

Family Advocates offer vital support and guidance to children and families impacted by abuse. As compassionate allies, they amplify the voices of children and prioritize their needs, providing emotional support, resources, and empowerment through the legal process. This approach aids in immediate recovery, contributes to breaking the cycle of abuse, and fosters resilience, laying the groundwork for a brighter future for every child.



# **51%** of cases were court involved.



Court School is a specifically designed curriculum used to make the court process less intimidating for children. Court School helps children understand the importance of their testimony, and allows them the opportunity to practice being a witness and answering questions not related to the case. Court School helps children become familiar with the courtroom process and the people they will meet there.

# COMMUNITY RESPONSE

Brittany is available each day to assist caregivers, therapists, school personnel, and other community members with concerns for their children or children they know. She connects caregivers and other supportive adults to resources including therapy, housing, basic needs, and legal services. Brittany is an incredible advocate for concerned individuals who are unfamiliar with the reporting and investigative processes.

Brittany works closely with investigative partners to coordinate a response once a report of child abuse or neglect has been made. In situations where investigative agencies are not involved, Brittany provides individualized education to callers and offers alternative interventions and referrals.

Families often feel isolated due to the nature of their concerns. Brittany is able to provide the guidance and support families need when they're at their most vulnerable.

## THE IMPACT

*We recently received a call from a family seeking support in addressing sexualized behavior in one of their children. Our primary aim is to ensure that these families are connected with the necessary services and resources.*

*We diligently assessed the situation and provided referrals tailored to the specific needs of the family. Following up with this family was integral to our approach; we regularly checked in to see whether they had successfully accessed the services we recommended.*

*It is heartening to hear from families who have been able to utilize the resources we suggested to them. We often receive updates from families, sometimes months later, sharing progress or simply expressing gratitude for our help during a challenging time. These interactions reaffirm the importance of our work in supporting families and children in need.*

# MEDICAL SERVICES

Medical examinations at BraveBe are conducted with sensitivity and compassion and are essential for ensuring the safety and well-being of children. All children with concerns of abuse or neglect are offered medical care to detect and address any health concerns, collect forensic evidence, and to provide education, reassurance, and support. BraveBe medical providers create a safe space for children to ask questions about their bodies. By emphasizing the importance of their health and well-being, our providers strive to empower children, instilling in them a sense of control over their bodies.

## MORE HIGHLIGHTS

In 2023, BraveBe began offering on-site acute sexual assault exams, enabling the collection of evidence kits within critical timeframes—72 hours for pre-pubescent children and 120 hours for adolescents following instances of sexual abuse.

BraveBe strengthened partnerships with Bryan Health, CHI Health, Lincoln Police Department, and the Attorney General's Office through a protocol that enhances collaboration between hospital nurses, family advocates, and medical providers. This includes 24/7 consultation with BraveBe nurses to determine if examinations can be deferred to BraveBe for specialized care in lieu of the traditional hospital response.

In collaboration with the Department of Health and Human Services, BraveBe's medical team now conducts entry exams for children entering the foster care system. This allows for prompt identification of urgent medical needs and connects children with community resources for ongoing care; ensuring children enter foster care in good health.



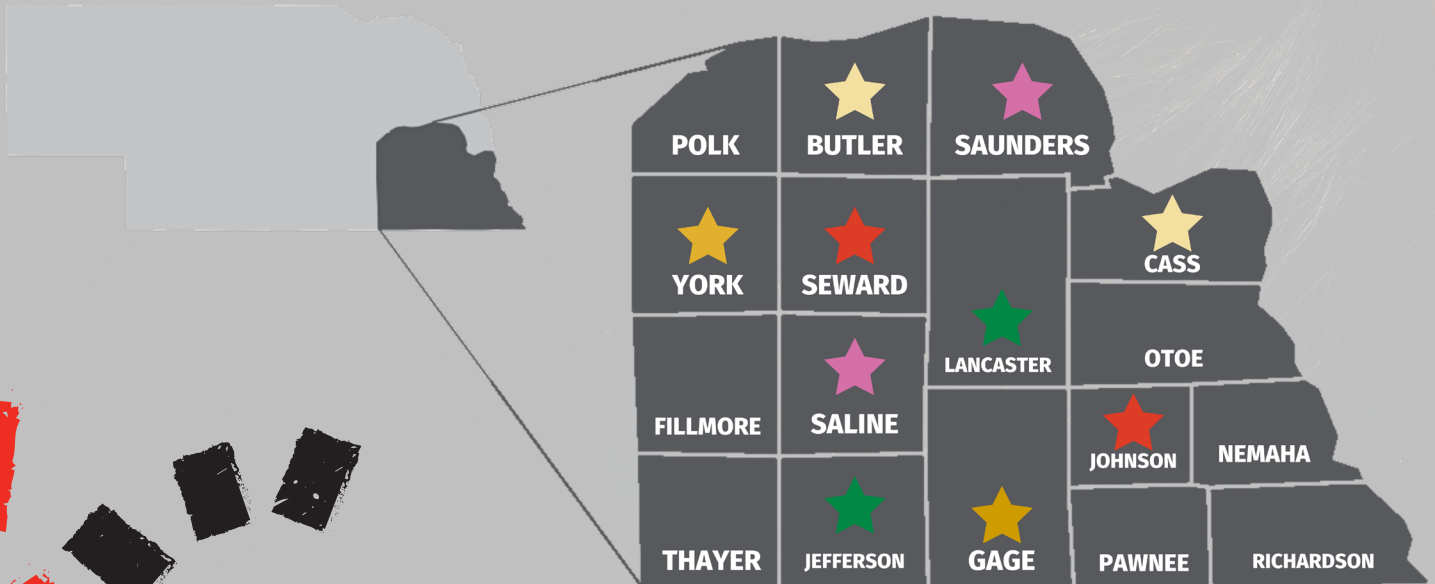
BraveBe has expanded its reach by opening a satellite location in Beatrice, NE. This new site brings trauma-informed, no-cost services closer to families in rural communities, removing barriers to care for children who have experienced abuse or neglect. This expansion reflects BraveBe's continued commitment to providing compassionate, accessible care for children across Southeast Nebraska.

# T.R.A.C.E.

## Team Response to Anti-Trafficking & Child Exploitation

Lancaster County's T.R.A.C.E. team is a coalition of law enforcement and child welfare experts who provide a coordinated response to child victims of sex and/or labor trafficking, and children who are at high-risk of exploitation. The T.R.A.C.E. team provides direct intervention through case coordination and advocacy, as well as extensive community outreach and education. This team provides training for investigative personnel and civilians alike at local, state, and national levels. This commitment to education has expanded BraveBe's anti-trafficking efforts to 11 counties in Nebraska. In 2024, BraveBe T.R.A.C.E. staff evaluated 226 cases, emphasizing both individual intervention and systemic reform to prevent child trafficking.

# THE IMPACT: KAELEIGH

When Kaeleigh arrived at BraveBe, she was just shy of her 16th birthday. Outwardly, she was bright, curious, and eager to talk about everyday things—family trips, future dreams, and even the giant fish she saw during her tour. But beneath her composed exterior was a teenager carrying the weight of years of trauma.

Kaeleigh had come forward after her older sister disclosed abuse by the same perpetrator. During her four-hour forensic interview, she spoke with clarity and strength, answering difficult questions and even asking some of her own. At one point, she paused to ask, **“If I don’t feel comfortable talking about something, can I just say that?”** It was clear that she understood this was her story to tell—and she was determined to share it on her terms.

Her bravery was unmistakable, but what stood out most was her conviction. Even in the face of trauma, Kaeleigh held tightly to hope. She believed that telling her story mattered, and she never lost sight of the possibility of healing.

Throughout the investigation, trial, and eventual sentencing of her perpetrator, Kaeleigh remained strong. Her Advocate, Aubrey, walked alongside her and her family every step of the way—offering support, building trust, and creating moments of connection that allowed Kaeleigh and her sibling to just be kids again. The day of sentencing brought a mix of emotions: grief, relief, and a deep sense of justice.

Kaeleigh’s journey reflects the resilience and strength of so many children served by BraveBe. With the support of a multidisciplinary team, advocates, and a trauma-informed approach, children like Kaeleigh are seen, heard, and believed as they begin their paths toward healing.

# THE IMPACT: Outcome Measurement Surveys

BraveBe collects feedback from children and their caregivers through Outcome Measurement Surveys, leading the national standard with about 85% of families participating. These surveys help us understand the family's experience and are used in strategic planning. In response to the 2022 survey results identifying mental health services as a crucial need for families, BraveBe expanded its mental health facilities and providers.

# PATHWAYS

Mental health plays a vital role in healing for children who have experienced abuse. BraveBe Family Advocates made 843 referrals for mental health services through the Pathways program which connects families with:

- Emotional Support
- Trauma Recovery
- Improved Mental Health
- Enhanced Coping Skills
- Prevention of Long-Term Effects
- Empowerment and Self-Esteem

Many families have found BraveBe to be a nurturing environment for their healing journey. To further accommodate the demand, BraveBe has collaborated with private therapists and Project SAFE from the University of Nebraska to bolster our on-site mental health services. In 2023, Family Advocates made 508 referrals to our on-site providers. These providers offer trauma-informed, evidence-based treatment methods tailored to the specific needs of children and families.

BraveBe's MDT Coordinators work closely with partner agencies to coordinate a collaborative response to the investigation and treatment of child abuse. They facilitate investigation and treatment team meetings in 17 counties. In 2023, the various multidisciplinary teams reviewed 3,173 cases of alleged child maltreatment involving 7,075 children. Our partner agencies include local, state, and federal law enforcement, Department of Health and Human Services, prosecuting attorneys, Juvenile Probation, schools, medical and mental health professionals, and other victim and child serving organizations.

## PEER REVIEW FACILITATOR FOR FORENSIC INTERVIEWS

Accreditation through the National Children's Alliance requires all forensic interviewers to participate in a structured forensic interview peer review process at least two times per year. Peer review serves as a quality assurance mechanism that reinforces the methodologies utilized and provides support and problem-solving for participants. Structured peer review encompasses opportunities for review and performance feedback in a professional and confidential setting, as well as opportunities for networking, relevant research and training in the field.

In 2024, BraveBe staff member, Jake Hedden facilitated 9 peer review sessions for the Midwest Regional Child Advocacy Center (MRCAC). There was an average of 9 forensic interviewers per session, representing at least 6 different states, including Alaska and Hawaii.

# Eevee!



Eevee, BraveBe's beloved comfort dog, has now been with us for over a year—and she has truly become everyone's favorite teammate. Whether sitting quietly with a child during a forensic interview, offering a calming presence in the lobby, or greeting staff with a wagging tail, Eevee brings a unique kind of support that words often can't. Her gentle nature helps ease anxiety, fosters trust, and provides moments of lightness during difficult days. Beyond her work with the children we serve, Eevee is a source of comfort and connection for our staff and partners, reminding all of us that healing happens in many forms—including four paws and a kind heart.

**THE IMPACT:** Each week, six-year-old Jonathon and his foster mom return to BraveBe for therapy, and a consistent source of comfort in his healing journey has been Eevee. The bond Jonathon has formed with Eevee extends far beyond our walls—his foster mom recently shared that one of our Eevee stickers now hangs in his room. On tough days, when emotions feel overwhelming, they go to the sticker together and talk to it, as if Eevee were right there beside them. This simple ritual has become a powerful tool for helping Jonathon regulate his emotions, a reminder that Eevee's calming presence continues to support his healing, even from afar.

## TRAINING FOR PARTNERS & PROVIDERS: Child Abuse & Neglect 101

This course trains mandatory reporters to effectively identify and report child abuse and neglect. Participants learn through discussions on reporting challenges, practicing minimal facts interviewing, accessing resources, and gaining confidence in recognizing and reporting abuse promptly. Activities cover defining abuse, understanding reporting obligations, questioning techniques, and the roles of child protective services, law enforcement, and child advocacy centers. The course targets school personnel, healthcare professionals, youth organizations, and the public, empowering a wide range of individuals to protect children in our community.

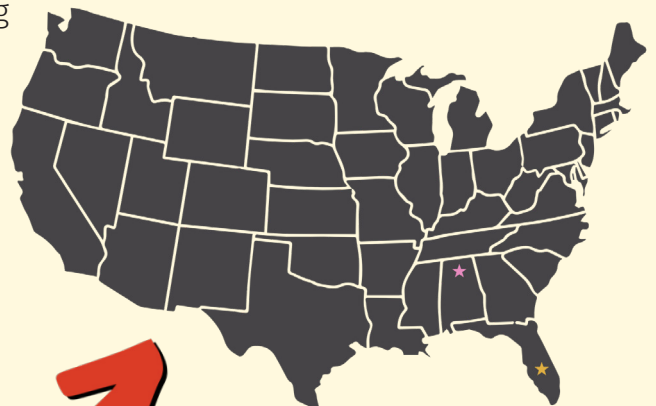


**BraveBe** child advocacy center **ON THE MOVE**

## TRAINING FOR YOUTH:

BraveBe now offers Digital Citizenship as a school-based prevention program for youth. The goal of this training is to help keep youth safe while they are exploring online platforms. The program empowers youth to understand the impact of their digital footprint and how to spot and respond to cyberbullying and digital dangers.

Building Resilient Families is a free educational course focused on equipping families with practical tools to navigate challenges, strengthen relationships, and support overall physical and mental well-being. The course covers a range of topics, including strategies for managing stress, promoting emotional health, and fostering connection within the family unit.

In addition to structured learning, the course emphasizes peer interaction. Participants engage with others in their cohort, exchanging experiences and learning in a collaborative setting. This shared approach helps families gain multiple perspectives and feel supported by others facing similar circumstances.

# brave fACES

Brave fACES focuses on preventing, recognizing, and responding to Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), informed by the landmark study by Kaiser Permanente and the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). ACEs encompass abuse, neglect, and household dysfunction, with high ACE scores correlating with severe health risks such as ischemic heart disease, strokes, and mental health challenges.

BraveBe's Brave fACES crafted a strategic plan with five primary goals for ACE **prevention** and **intervention**:




## Community Data Collection Training Initiatives Partnership Building Community Response Planning


These priority areas will employ the CDC's six strategies to enhance economic supports, promote social norms, ensure childhood well-being, educate families, provide mentorship for youth, and integrate trauma-informed care across sectors. By emphasizing prevention, resilience, and trauma-informed approaches, the Institute aims to address health disparities at their root, focusing on holistic well-being and positive childhood experiences.

Through a powerful partnership with Community Health Endowment (CHE) and Catholic Health Initiatives (CHI), BraveBe Child Advocacy Center successfully launched the Brave fACES initiative to the public in November 2024. Since its launch, Brave fACES has offered a series of well-attended community trainings centered on ACEs, the impact of trauma, and practical strategies for building resilient families. Recognized by CHE as a Legacy Project, Brave fACES reflects a shared commitment to addressing the root causes of trauma and creating lasting change. Together, BraveBe, CHE, CHI and other community partners are supporting a healthier future for all children and families in our community.
